BUSINESS FROM THE FLOOR

Daniel Gniewecki from Legislator Bruso's Office stated they were going to begin publishing a monthly newsletter. Newsletter is slated to be published once a month. Shared Legislator Bruso's thanks to Bill Rogers and the Highway Dept. for their good work during the winter storms. Legislator Bruso is a member of the opioid task force; at a recent meeting they found confirmed death by over doses went from 251 in 2017 to 148 in 2018 which shows that the task force is effective.

Randy Krieger, 328 Exchange Street and 299 Exchange Street: Mr. Krieger stated he had general concerns. He began to explain that on January 4, 2019 his Uncle was driving his tractor on South Lake road, entering his driveway, when a he was struck by a vehicle and killed. Mr. Krieger would like to see farm implement signs put up on Exchange Street to slow traffic down and make drivers aware that farm tractors use that roadway. Says that in his opinion Exchange has become a "cow path" for speeding traffic, including trucks, and the roadway is deteriorating. People swerve all over the road to avoid potholes. He also is tired of picking up trash that people throw from their vehicles onto his property. He would also like to see littering signs put up too. Supervisor Savage noted that Exchange is a County Road and that Mr. Gniewecki is an aid to Legislator Bruso's Office and he can communicate the concerns over road conditions to the Legislator. Mr. Krieger stated if the County is not going to remediate Exchange Street, they need to lower the speed limit due to the amount of truck traffic. He also noted he had read in the Advertiser about the upcoming change in refuse pick-up providers and how the public needs to be educated on the changes. He noted residents of Exchange Street intentionally put their bins out backwards so that passing traffic does not blow the lids open and spill trash everywhere. Supervisor Savage noted the bins need to be placed properly at the road as a mechanized truck will come by and pick up and empty the bins. Also that the Town cannot put signage on a County Road, however, Mr. Gniewecki will express these concerns to Legislator Bruso. Mr. Krieger is frustrated that the tax dollars are not being put to use fixing the condition of Exchange Street. Mr. Gniewecki noted that there are projects in the works for repairing roadways. Mr. Krieger also questioned who was responsible for the street lights because they are out all over Town. Supervisor Savage stated the Town is however, NYSEG maintains them and the Town is in the process of converting to LED. Mr. Krieger questioned the Village tying into the Exchange water line and asked if those taxpayers will be seeing money from that? Supervisor Savage stated, No. Mr. Krieger stated they should get something for the Village tying into their waterline, the same way Marilla is getting money from Exchange Street residents for use of their waterline. Supervisor Savage explained that it does not work that way and those residents are not paying for Marilla's waterline or any other municipalities line between here and the lake. Supervisor Savage continued to explain he understood Mr. Krieger's concerns; however, it doesn't work that way.

Steve (resident) asked Supervisor Savage for an update on the refuse. Supervisor Savage stated that he signed a contract and Patrick was going to be picking it up. The carts will be delivered within the next few weeks. Inside the carts will be information on schedules and additional information. Also an additional mailer will be sent as well as updates on social media. He also noted how recycle has turned around and is costly. Supervisor Savage proceeded to mention some of the new changes, ie. bag tags, quarterly bulk pickup.

SUPERVISOR SAVAGE POLLED THE TOWN BOARD AND WITH NO OBJECTIONS ADDED:

THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION WAS OFFERED BY COUNCILWOMAN PAUTLER, WHO MOVED ITS ADOPTION, SECONDED BY COUNCILMAN ADAMSKI TO WIT;

WHEREAS Governor Cuomo's proposed 2020 NYS Budget includes unprecedented cuts to unrestricted State Revenue Sharing program known as Aid and Incentives to Municipalities (AIM) in the amount of 49 million, effectively eliminating the program; and

WHEREAS, funding has not been increased in the last several years as unfunded mandates and cost of Town and Village services have risen; and

WHEREAS, if these cuts go through, a shocking 91% of Towns and Villages will permanently lose their AIM funding; and

WHEREAS, incentives for shared services, consolidation, and infrastructure remediation directed by consent orders in no way replace the needed financial assistance to fun and manage the increasing costs of day to day services and capital projects needed in sustainable Town and Village planning and management; and

WHEREAS, the proposal to eliminate AIM funding unfairly punishes State residents, making financial planning aligned with the NYS Tax Cap virtually impossible; and

WHEREAS, the Governor is proposing to make the Tax Cap permanent, discontinue the \$65 Million in Extreme Winter Recovery Program and proposes no increase for CHIPs funding for which there has been widespread vocal support; and

WHEREAS, the proposal to eliminate AIM funding is not proactive, but a method to cut a small percent from the State Budget, yet a significant amount of revenue to Town and Village budgets; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Town of Alden strongly opposes

The elimination of AIM funding;

FURTHER RESOLVED, the AIM funding benefits all of our residents not only in Erie County but throughout New York State and eliminating it could result in services, program cuts and layoffs. Every dollar that the State shared is a dollar that doesn't have to be levied on the backs of the taxpayers, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a certified copy of this resolution be forwarded to
Honorable Governor Andrew M. Cuomo, Honorable Speaker of the Assembly Carl E. Heastie,
Honorable Senate Majority Leader Andres Stewart-Cousins, Honorable Republican Minority
Leader John Flanagan, Acting Honorable Republican Minority Leader Joseph Griffo,
Honorable Majority Leader of the Assembly Crystal People-Stokes, Honorable Minority Leader
Of the Assembly Brian Kolb, and the Western New York Delegation and Erie County
Executive Mark Poloncarz and the Erie County Legislature.
