# HAPPY NEW YEAR... 1923!!



As we close out the Town's Bicentennial Year, let's take a step back, to the Town's Centennial Year in 1923. What was going on in the world, in the US, in New York, and in Alden in 1923?

The population of the world reached 2.02 billion in 1923. In contrast, last week it was announced that the world's population had reached 8 billion. The "war to end all wars" had ended five years before; however, there were already rumblings of trouble again in Europe. In September, following a military coup in Spain, Miguel De Rivera took over setting up a dictatorship. In October, Turkey became a republic, bringing an end to the Ottoman Empire. Then in November, Adolf Hitler led the Nazi Party in a failed coup attempt in Germany He was arrested, tried for treason, sentenced to five years in prison, but was released after only nine months. In Asia, the Great Kanto earthquake devastated Tokyo and Yokohama, killing over 100,000 people.

The President of the United States was Warren Harding. Upon word of his death on August 2, Vice President Calvin Coolidge, who was vacationing at home in Vermont, was administered the oath of office by his father who was a Justice of the Peace.

The US was in the early years of nationwide prohibition and in the decade known as the Roaring 20s and the Jazz Age. Some other happenings one hundred years ago were:

- Insulin became widely used as treatment for diabetes.
- Surgeons performed the first successful brain tumor operation.
- Transcontinental airmail service began.
- The first baseball game was played in Yankee Stadium—Yankees vs. Boston Sox; the Yankees won.
- The first radio broadcast of a hockey game was heard.
- The first sound short films were shown in New York City.
- Roy and Walt Disney founded the Disney Brothers Cartoon Studio.
- Time magazine published its first issue.
- Firestone produced its first rubber tire.
- Women's hems went up and waists went down.
- Top names for boys were John, Robert and William; for girls Mary, Dorothy and Helen.
- #1 songs were "Yes, We Have No Bananas", "Barney Google", and "Who's Sorry Now?".

Alfred "Al" Smith, a Democrat, was Governor of New York in 1923. He served from 1918- 1920, was reelected in 1922, 1924 and 1926. After a failed campaign for President of the United States in 1928, Smith became president of Empire State, Inc., the corporation that built and operated the Empire State Building.

In Alden, Otto Wende was Town Supervisor and Isaac N. Chase was President of the Village Board of Trustees and of the Village. Mr. Chase was the station master of the Erie Railroad station. The Alden High School, in the 1914 building on Park Street, had an enrollment of 261 students, 97 of which were high school students. The rural schools accommodated students from first grade through eighth grade.

The Alden Veneer Manufacturing Co maker of bushel baskets, Bennett Manufacturing Co., Alden Broom Works and Pfeil's Beanery were employers, as were the three black water bathhouses. The Alden State Bank, the Alden Advertiser and Stowell's Pharmacy were fledging businesses. You could buy just about everything at Wahl Brothers store or T.B. Yaeger's store in the village or Charles Arndt's store in Town Line. You could buy fresh, salted and smoked meats at A. Simme and Sons village meat market or Kieffer's Bros. in Town Line, You could buy hardware from John R. Dean or Charles Chelius. Alden Motor Sales Corp. sold Fords and Eastwood Garage sold tires and tubes. Frank Young, Ernest Siehl and G.F. Ayers ran feed mills. Frank Bishop and Henry Urshel were blacksmiths. Black Water Baths patients and travelers could stay at Chernoff's Hotel, Hotel Egbert, or at Rist Hotel (Whistle Stop). Alger and Hart sold insurance, J.B. Miller had a florist shop. A.E. Frantz had a furniture and undertaking business. Dr. C.A. Randel was the local dentist and Doctors Clarence Tyler, Benjamin Gipple and Warren Gipple held office hours and made house calls

Perhaps the biggest news from Alden involved the Erie County Penitentiary and Farm and the Erie County Home and Infirmary in Millgrove. State inspectors who visited the newly constructed penitentiary in August acclaimed it "the best and most complete penal institution in the state", and to their knowledge "the best in the country." Three items of contention did crop up during the year. In February, the Commissioner asked that homes be built for the Farm employees, stating that getting back and forth to Buffalo would be "practically impossible" considering their hours of work. In May, the Buffalo Street Commissioner wanted to have the prisoners feed the pigs on the Farm with city garbage. Supervisor Otto Wende vehemently opposed the idea. In December, the Buffalo Street Commissioner proposed a garbage incinerator be built on the Farm to handle the garbage from the east side of Buffalo.


Better news that year involved the construction of the Erie County Home and Infirmary. The lowest bidder was an Erie, PA firm with a bid almost \$400,000 under the \$1 million estimate of the architects. The Board of Supervisors stated that they would rather have a local firm, but if the Erie firm would consent to employ Erie County residents, they would be satisfied. Construction began that fall.

Wonder what will be the news from Alden in 2023. Happy New Year!

# Curator's Corner

When the Alden Advertiser recently moved out of the old bank building, hundreds of photographs were found. One of those photos is now upstairs in the hallway of the Heritage Center. It features a handsome Holstein bull named Rex Wanderbelle Ormsby Jane.



He is the world's highest record bull who lived on the Dold Brothers farm called Alden Crest. His stud fee was \$100. The farm was located where the Alden Plaza (The Post Office and Save A Lot) now stands and extended across the railroad down Exchange Street.

The Dold Brothers also owned a huge meat-packing plant in Buffalo and were the founders of the Alden State Bank. All of this took place in the early years of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

On a side note: In May of 1919, a cattle auction was held for a Holstein herd from Elma, NY. Mr. Dold paid \$22,000 for a yearling heifer and \$10,000 for a two- week female calf. \$22,000 in 1919 is the equivalent of \$378,974.80 today. \$10,000 would be \$172,261.27. A \$100 stud fee would be \$1722.61.


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# Alden Historical Society Annual Membership Meeting
