In the late 1800's to the 1940's, Germany began to make candy containers from paper mache' in molds. These were especially common at Easter time. We have a lovely blue and gray rabbit in our collection. The head comes off and allows the body to be filled with candy for Easter morning. Paper mache' Easter eggs were also produced for the same purpose.

Because of their construction, not many of these early containers survived. They can be found in antique stores and on-line but we are extremely lucky to have one in good condition. It will be on display through the month of April.

Easter Eggs (from "Hometown Favorites Historical Society cookbook)

With egg prices high, maybe this recipe could be the Easter eggs this year.

Easter Eggs

1/4 lb. butter

1/2 c. milk

1 lb confectioner's sugar

2 packages chocolate, vanilla or butterscotch

pudding, (NOT INSTANT)

1 tsp vanilla

Melt butter. Add pudding and milk. Boil 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add sugar and vanilla. Shape into eggs. Frost with chocolate bits and milk, melted together

April 13—The electric chair



Maria Blair, owner of No Illusions Tours, will give a presentation on William Kemmler and the brutal crime he committed that led him to be the first person to die in the electric chair. You'll also learn about the invention itself by Alfred P. Souhtwick. Ironically, both tales are entirely Buffalo-based as Southwick was a Buffalo native who researched and created the electric chair here and Kemmler committed his crime in the city as well. The presentation will take you through the development of the invention and the process of New York state's move to the electric chair as the new form of capital punishment, to the details of the crime, arrest and trial. The execution in Auburn State prison east of Buffalo and its reception will also be covered.

Our program will at held at 1352 Exchange Street, Alden, this evening. Mark Casell will host a presentation about the Exchange Street Depot located there, and owned by he and his wife Diane. Alden at one point had four railroads passing through Alden, all important to Alden's early economic growth and development. The Exchange Street Depot was once a busy stop for passengers and cargo alike.

June 8—Legion Hall (Liberal Hall)



The Historical Society will be dedicating an historical marker to designate the Hall's rich history during tonight's program, being held at the Legion Hall, 13143 Broadway, Alden. The Hall had its beginnings as a Baptist Church during the mid 19th century and became a popular center for cultural events. Marlene Roll will talk on flag etiquette and Roger Erny will give background information about the Legion. Town and Village Historian Karen Muchow will also present a history of the building.

Newspaper Clips

Buffalo Courier March 18, 1900

There has been a good deal of thieving going on of late at the school building in Alden. Not only have lunches been taken but money, mittens, and many small articles that were left in the cloak room. Some of the teachers are among the losers.

Buffalo Evening News October 9, 1896

Alden, N.Y.--(Special)-J. W. Wolcott (Railroad Street) had 21 ducks and 36 chickens stolen last night. It will be possible to discover the thief if proper efforts are made, for the fowl had a private mark and the horse driven by the thieves had a peculiar kind of shoe.

Past Programs



At its January 12 program, the Historical Society hosted Mark Casell presenting "A Bicentennial Tale of Trilobites and Aldenites." Mark began his presentation by sharing the geological history of the north woods and slate banks that line Spring Creek east of Crittenden Rd. near the northern edge of the village. He identified various fossils and passed out samples that he had discovered following along the creek.

He then spoke of various activities that have taken place there through the years. He displayed a map showing three former racetracks that drew crowds of spectators in the mid 1900's. The woods had been the location for boy scout outings or "camporees." Some of the land in that area is privately owned while a portion is village owned and will hopefully remain undeveloped.

At the Historical Society's February 9 program, Alden Town and Village Historian Karen Muchow described the origin of Alden's black water industry. The first to discover Alden's black water was NYC resident Frank H. Westcott, who struck black water in the area now known as Alden Town Park when he was searching for natural gas in 1891. Continuing his search for natural gas, he purchased land on West Main Street where St. Aidan's Episcopal Church currently stands and in 1903, drilled and struck black water there.

Edward A. Milliman and his family moved to Alden in 1895. Likely influenced by the popularity of mineral spas at that time, Milliman became interested in the prospects for black water bathing. He offered baths in his own home for a time and in 1903, he joined with Westcott in purchasing property on the north side of West Main St. By 1906, Milliman became the sole owner of that property and developed a bath house and hotel there, completed in 1912. During those same years, Milliman became involved with the Empire Hotel and bath house on Exchange Street.



Frank Westcott's son, Henry P. Westcott, moved to Alden with his father and family in 1897. Henry oversaw the development of Frank's property on the south side of West Main St. which became known as the Original Black Water Bath House. In 1920, Henry sold his shares and pursued other interests, principally in the natural gas and oil industries.

All three men contributed to Alden's growth and development through their leadership in developing the black water bath industry which provided a variety of jobs for local residents and contributed to Alden's prosperity through the early to mid-1900's. Elli DeFilippo


