Alden Intermediate fourth grade students visited the Alden Historical Society's Heritage Center and the Henskee Road Schoolhouse in early June. At the schoolhouse, they experienced what it would have been like to attend one of Alden's one-room schools in the late 1800s to the early 1900s. This included using slates for seat work, recitations, and a spelling bee. At the Heritage Center, the students reviewed a variety of topics from their social studies curriculum by coloring a nine-patch quilt block. A brief tour of the Heritage Center followed.

Revising our Mission (and a New Logo)


A few years ago, the Alden Historical Society adopted a new name for its building at 13213 Broadway. Gone is the sign "Alden Historical Museum". We are chartered by the New York State Department of Education as an historical society with a collection, not as a museum. That designation involves a different chartering process. The Board of Trustees decided on the name "Alden Heritage Center" for the building.

This year, the Board discussed its mission statement, and after much discussion settled on a revision:

The Alden Historical Society is dedicated to the preservation, presentation and promotion of the rich heritage of the Town of Alden.

In fulfilling this mission, the Society will:

- Identify, preserve, and display material including artifacts, photos and papers of historical significance to the cultural heritage of the Town of Alden. (Cultural heritage implies a shared bond, our belonging to a community. It represents our history and our identity, our bond to our past, our present and our future.)
- Preserve and open to the public historical buildings deeded to the Town of Alden. (Alden Heritage Center and the Henskee Road Schoolhouse.)
- Make its resources accessible to members, researchers, genealogists, and the general public.
- Hold meetings, create exhibits, sponsor programs and run special events for the education and enjoyment of its members, the Alden community, and the general public.





A new name and a revised mission called for a new logo. Vice-President Christopher Gust took on the task. After viewing several, the two logos included here were adopted by the Board and will appear on publications and correspondence.

When the 4th grades were visiting the Heritage Center in June, many of the children asked about the game of Mumblety-Peg. It involves jack-knives and was popular with 19th century boys even through WWII. The basics involve a boy standing with his feet shoulder width apart. He then throws his knife down as close to his foot as possible so that it sticks in the ground. The boy's partner then has a turn throwing the knife at his own foot. The one who gets closest to his foot wins. The winner then pounds a stick into the ground 2-3 inches. The loser then pulls the stick out with his teeth which often makes a mumble sound. There are many variations to this game which was played in school yards and army camps.

Programs Recap

April program - History of Early Buffalo Entertainment

Guest speaker Rick Falkowski shared his extensive knowledge about the early history of Buffalo music and entertainment at the Alden Community Center on April 11. Among the many facts shared was that the world's first "talkie" motion picture, "The Jazz Singer," was shown in Buffalo at the Lafayette Theater, on the corner of Washington and Broadway. Additionally, the first theater built specifically for showing motion pictures, the Vitascope, was built in Buffalo in the basement of the Ellicott Square Building. A discussion on Buffalo music covered the early days of live performances in the seedy bars located at the original Canalside to jazz and swing and the birth of rock and roll.

Mr. Falkowski is the author of several books about Buffalo history and influential people. More information about his books is available at buffalomusichistory.com.

May program - WNY Healing Waters and Resorts

The Society welcomed Erica Joan Wanecski at the Alden Community Center on May 9. Ms. Wanecski identified several communities in Western New York, in addition to Alden, where in years past, hotels and resorts were built for the purpose of providing healing water baths and spas. Among the communities mentioned were Dansville, Mt. Morris, Castile, Warsaw, Alabama, and Bergen. She also mentioned Clifton Springs and Geneva in Central New York and Saratoga Springs in Eastern New York. Ms. Wanecski shared that in earlier times, information about taking mineral water baths as a treatment for healing aches and pains may have come from Native Americans who had used them for that purpose.

June program - Hometown Heroes

Alden Historical Society President and Village Clerk Sue Galbraith led a presentation on Alden's Hometown Hero banners, a program she helped to initiate, at the Society's June 13 program. Sue led off by sharing details about Alden's earliest settler, Moses Fenno, who died in the War of 1812. She went on to discuss Civil War casualty Samuel Young. Sue invited those present to share details about family members depicted on the banners. Jean Weisbeck, Robin Gilbert, and Elli DeFilippo shared details about their fathers. Sue concluded the program by sharing details about some of Alden's more recent veterans. Alden has more than 160 Hometown Hero banners. An updated booklet identifying the military personnel featured on the banners will be available soon. ~Elli DeFilippo
