Last Wednesday the Town took reservations for this season's park pavilions. Councilman Peter DiCostanzo and I came in very early in the morning to let residents into the Town Hall, with some having waited since the day before to reserve a Pavilion. Verification of residency and payment needs to be done at the time of reserving, so this remains an in-person process. There had been consideration to do online reservations but the concern is how to control who is reserving, and how many reservations are being made at one time. We also limit one reservation per person the first day. Pavilion Rentals are limited to residents of Clarence only.

We handed out numbered cards to help keep order for our residents who had been waiting in line for hours for the Clerk's office to open. Town Clerk Karen Hawes, who opened her office early, had over 60 residents in Town Hall ready to make reservations. The Clerk's office had forms with instructions available online and in the lobby at Town Hall. Most pavilions were registered in minutes, so the line moved quickly. By the end of the day 98 reservations were made for pavilions. Reservations can still be made daily from 8:30 to 4:30 at Town Hall.

Other Town Clerk's offices have limited hours of business and have their residents make reservations for simple items done at the office. Because of the that, our Clerk handles licenses of all types including marriage licenses for people who live in other Towns. Thank you, Karen Hawes and your staff for accommodating our residents on a very busy day. Thank you to the residents for your patience and understanding of this process as we try to make this fair for all.
