The Work Session meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Clarence was held on Wednesday October 9, 2024 at the Clarence Town Hall, One Town Place, Clarence, New York.

Supervisor Patrick Casilio called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m.

Members of the Town Board present were Councilmembers Robert Altieri, Daniel Michnik, J. Paul Shear, Peter DiCostanzo, and Supervisor Patrick Casilio. Other Town officials present were Director of Community Development Jonathan Bleuer, Town Engineer Timothy Lavocat and Town Attorney Lawrence Meckler.

Director of Community Development - Jonathan Bleuer PUBLIC HEARINGS: None

FORMAL AGENDA ITEMS:

Annul Community Development Block Grant Program.

The Town has identified Rural Transit Services, Inc. for project consideration and will set a public hearing.

Shaun Pierce

The applicant is present and seeking referral to the Planning Board for a secondary living unit at 8191 Clarence Lane North. The Town has some questions regarding this. It does require a variance for set-back, they are proposing to be only five feet off the property line the side lot line. If this is referred to the Planning Board it would be subject to not only Planning Board recommendation, but ultimately the Zoning Board of Appeals review as well as Building review.

Councilman Paul Shear asks if the house is brick or vinyl. Jonathan Bleuer states it would be all vinyl. The neighbors would be notified and the meetings would be held at night for the Planning Board as well as the Zoning Board. The public will have plenty of opportunity to share their comments should they have any.

WORK SESSION ITEMS:

Edge Development, LLC.

The applicant is requesting preliminary Conceptual review of a proposed mixed-use project containing multiple-family housing and commercial space. Location is 9105 Sheridan Drive south side of Sheridan Drive west of Main Street. The applicant has verified his proposal does meet the underlying zoning code height requirement of 45 feet although it will require a variance for the third floor for a mixed-use building. He's also reduced the total unit count from 24 to 22 apartments. He has removed the only 2 apartments on the first floor of the mixed-use building which has bumped up the commercial space from 5200 to 7000 square foot. He is hoping this will be put on the next formal agenda for referral to the Planning Board.

Councilman Shear asked if it was that close to the street. Jonathan replied yes, it does have a proposed 10ft front yard setback. Councilman DiCostanzo asks if that is because we want the cars in back. Jonathan says yes, we do want cars on the side or in back. Jonathan states we are looking for ways to calm traffic, to slow down traffic. One way to do that is to bring things in towards the street. We will have to look at the area and future build out, but this is a good starting point.

Councilman DiCostanzo asks if the notes say limited to 16 residential for the septic. Jonathan says yes, that is our local law.

Natale Builders

The applicant in Spaulding Green at 9800 Longleaf Trail is proposing to have a lower floor kitchen area that has all the makings of being a secondary unit, but will be entertainment space. As such does require review. As it is shown it doesn't look any different from any other houses. It's just how the lower level is built out. As such you may see fit to set a public hearing on this to allow for the deed restrictions.

Councilman Shear asks to go back to the basement view. He states it looks like it could be a second apartment. Jonathan agrees and says that is why we need it deed restricted. It is the same design as every other house, it's just what they are putting in there.

Christopher & Lorissa Naugle

Applicants at 5024 Rockhaven Dr. in the Spaulding Lake development have an existing home which they are proposing a significant addition. This would include a garage and a

secondary living unit area. It is a 2-story design. The first floor has a garage element and an entertainment/kitchen area followed by a 2^{nd} floor apartment unit. This would require a variance for set back and up to the Board for the process to follow. It can be sent to the Planning Board to follow the process for Clarence Lane North you could do that.

Scott Irish-Bronkie

The Applicant is looking to demolish a structure at 10594 Main St. This will be put on an upcoming formal agenda to make a final determination. Jonathan states the Historical Preservation Commission was created in 2005. In 2007 the Certified Local Government was formed, which means we adopted a local law to govern that commission. There were some differences between NYS model law and Town law. The NYS model law gave the authority to the Historic Preservation Commission. In 2007 it was determined that the Town Board would retain authority. So, the Board has the authority for designations as well as historic boundaries. Per our law what's inside the home doesn't fall into the historic category.

Forty properties have been considered for designation. Twenty-eight have been designated by the Town Board. All twenty-eight had owner consent. Twelve had no action taken or were denied. Nine of those were not acted on by the Commission three of which they couldn't receive owner consent and three were sent without owner consent and you did not designate any of those. The structures still remain and were not demolished. Our law does require at a minimum that we do a Seeker review for a structure prior to 1950 and we have the Historic Commission provide their comments. This will be on the upcoming meeting on the 23rd. You will have to make a decision with the applicant present. Jonathan offers to help with crafting a Seeker declaration.

Councilman Altieri states there is a for sale sign in window, but wonders, is it really for sale. It is sale for 85K. Councilman Shear states it isn't wide enough to build on and doesn't think anyone would be interested in buying it.

Jonathan says for the Schafer property we can use a lot of the input from that demolition for this structure if it were to be demolished. In terms of inventory and documentation and perhaps reuse of any materials inside. They could talk to the applicant about their willingness to offer anything for sale.

WHEREAS, the Town of Clarence desires to advance the "Project" by making a commitment 100% non-Federal share of the cost of \$1,510,000.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Clarence Town Board, duly convened does hereby

RESOLVE, that the Clarence Town Board hereby authorizes the Town of Clarence to pay in the first instance 100% of the federal and non-federal share of the cost of \$1,510,000 for the "Project" or portions thereof; and it is further

RESOLVED, that the sum of \$1,510,000 is hereby made available by the Town of Clarence to cover the cost of participation in the above phase of the "Project"; and it is further

RESOLVED, that in the event the full federal and non-federal share costs of the project exceeds the amount appropriated above, the Town of Clarence shall convene as soon as possible to appropriate said excess amount immediately upon the notification thereof, and it is further

RESOLVED, that the Town Supervisor of the Town of Clarence be hereby authorized to execute all necessary agreements, certifications or reimbursement requests for Federal Aid and/or Marchiselli aid on behalf of the Town of Clarence with the New York State Department of Transportation in connection with the advancement or approval of the "Project" and providing for the administration of the "Project" and the municipality's first instance funding of project costs and permanent funding of the local share of federal-aid and state-aid eligible all "Project" costs that are not so eligible, and it is further

RESOLVED, that a certified copy of this resolution be filed with the New York State Commissioner of Transportation by attaching it to any necessary agreement in connection with the "Project", and it is further

RESOLVED, that a Certified Copy of this Resolution be filed with the Commissioner of Transportation of the State of New York by attaching it to any required and/or appropriate Agreements executed in connection with the project between and the State of New York; and it is further

RESOLVED, that this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

Supervisor Casilio asked for a brief summation.

Town Engineer Timothy Lavocat explained this motion is for the DOT grant that the DOT granted the Town of Clarence five million dollars for Clarence Center sidewalks. This is the contract for the initial design phases of that project which is an eighty percent reimbursement through DOT.

Councilman Shear said with living in Clarence Center, he thinks it is a great project.

Mr. Lavocat explained with this initial project the State has a preliminary bidding year of 2028. As you go through the process there are certain items to address, such as environmental and archeological, which could potentially push that out a couple years. Under this agreement the Town has ten years to complete the project from the date of the signed agreement.

Mr. Lavocat added that this is for the Engineering and Building Department building. Now that the Pocket Park is there and the decommissioned solar farm will be removed, the exterior of that building will get repointed and painted to help it better fit into that campus.

We have a metal roof on the front that leaks every winter. It was meant to be decorative, but because of the new entrance canopy it isn't visible. We will be switching to rubber which is maintenance free. Upon roll call – Ayes: All; Noes: None; Absent: None: Motion carried.

Motion by Supervisor Casilio, seconded by Councilman DiCostanzo to set a bid date of Thursday October 31, 2024 at 10:00 a.m. for the Residential Post Top Street Lighting Purchase Project.

Mr. Lavocat added that we are putting out to bid the purchase of two hundred post top street lights and connection fuses for our Parks Department to be able to go out and maintain and swap out failing high pressure sodium lights and new LED lights under a program with NYSEG.

Supervisor Casilio asked how many in total will have to be changed.

Mr. Lavocat said fourteen hundred.

- 1. Approval shall expire in six months, or upon the issuance of a Temporary Conditional Permit for outside storage, whichever comes first.
- 2. No display or advertisement of vehicles for sale, including but not limited to, signage and open hoods.
- 3. All vehicles must be stored in the designated areas behind the mall only.

Improvements have been done around the Historical Museum courtesy of the town Parks and Highway Departments, such as new benches and signs. The Highway Department will also be paving from the parking lot of the Museum into the Town Park. Also, the Youth Bureau is holding a Trunk n Treat event at the Town Park on Main Street Saturday October 12, 2024 from 5:30 - 8:00 p.m. Also, kudos to the Parks and Highway Departments for all their cooperation. Lastly, everyone should go look at the beautiful patio recently installed behind the Clubhouse at the Main Steet Town Park.

Motion by Councilman Altieri, seconded by Councilman Michnik on the recommendation of Councilman Robert Altieri and The Historic Preservation Commission, to appoint Laurie Hauer-LaDuca effective immediately October 9th, 2024 with the term ending December 31st, 2026. This opening is to fill the vacant seat left by Heath Szymczak.

Councilman Altieri reported there has been some work done at the Clarence Library by our Parks Department headed by Jason Holden. A couple curbs have been cut up. They have done some wonderful work getting ready to put in new sidewalks into the back shed. Everyone at the Library has been happy with their work. Also, the Lion's Club is getting ready for their pancake breakfast at the Clubhouse on Sunday December 8, 2024 from 8:00 - 1:00 p.m.

Gayle Brace, Deputy Town Clerk stated school taxes are due Tuesday October 15. Town Hall will be closed on Monday October 14 in observance of Columbus Day. Payments can be mailed with a US postmark, brought to the Town Clerk's office, dropped in the night depository to the right of the front door at Town Hall, or online where fees do apply. Seven- and one-half percent penalty will apply as of October 16. Any questions please call the Town Clerk's office.

Annual Community Development Block Grant Program is to set a Public Hearing to consider potential funding needs for Federal Community Development Block Grant request. Based on comments received, the Town has currently identified the Rural Transit Services, Inc. for consideration.

Motion made by Councilman DiCostanzo, seconded by Councilman Altieri to set a public hearing for November 6, 2024 at 10:15 a.m.in the Town of Clarence in the Town Hall auditorium, One Town Place, Clarence, NY 14031 regarding the use of Federal Community Development Block Grant Funds in the Town of Clarence.

The Town of Clarence is eligible for a Federal Community Development Grant under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended.

The purpose of the Hearing is to provide an opportunity for citizens to express community development and housing needs and to discuss possible projects which would benefit low- and moderate-income persons in the Town of Clarence.

Citizens are urged to attend this meeting to make known their views and/or written proposals on the Town of Clarence's selection of potential projects to be submitted for possible funding by the Federal Community Development Grant Program.

Shaun Pierce. 8191 Clarence Lane North on the Southeast corner of Clarence Lane North and Gott Creek Trail. This is an existing residence on a 0.44-acre parcel in the Residential Single-Family zone. The applicant is requesting a Special Exception Use Permit for the construction of a secondary living unit as an expansion to the existing residence. A referral to the Planning Board would allow for a thorough review of this proposal. The proposed secondary living unit addition is required to have a 12.5' side yard setback, however the proposal seeks a 5' side yard setback. Should the Town Board wish to consider this request, the applicant will be required to seek a 7.5' variance from the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Councilman DiCostanzo said this project will be a heavy lift through the Zoning Board of Appeals process.

Shaun Pierce said he does have some pictures with him for reference. It doesn't go out even as far as the variance that they applied for the existing garage. If anything, he thinks it will give his neighbors some privacy.

Supervisor Casilio asked the applicant if he understood that if this makes it through the process there will be a deed restriction on the property that it can not ever be an apartment.

Mr. Pierce said he understood.

Councilman Michnik asked if the neighbors are aware of what he is doing.

Mr. Pierce said yes.

Councilman Altieri thanked Mr. Pierce for his service and asked what he meant by his previous comment regarding a prior variance.

Mr. Pierce said the prior owners requested a variance to build the existing garage and the additional living space requested now won't extend beyond that garage.

Motion by Councilman Shear, seconded by Councilman Altieri to refer the request of the applicant, Shaun Pierce, for Special Exception Use Permit to the Planning Board to allow for a thorough review to consider the construction for an attached secondary living unit as part of the existing residence at 8191 Clarence Lane North in the Single-Family Residential Zone.
