LOCAL LAW INTRO NO. 8 -2003

**A LOCAL LAW** amending, Local Law No. 1-1959, as amended, constituting the Erie County Charter Section 1802 thereof; and the Erie County Administrative Code Section 18.02 Sub. f with respect to the duty of the Erie County Executive to submit a budget and capital program to the Erie County Legislature.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Short title. This Local Law shall be known as the "Erie County Budget Disclosure Act" and shall amend, as hereinafter specified Section 1802 of the Erie County Charter and Section 18.02 Sub. f of the Erie County Administrative Code.

Section 2. Legislative Intent. The Erie County Legislature hereby determines that the people of Erie County have the right to know the contents of and fiscal implication of County Executive's tentative budget for the ensuing fiscal year, and the extent of the capital program to ensure fiscal accountability.

Section 3. Provisions. The following provisions shall be inserted to amend the Erie County Charter and the Administrative Code to the extent of the provisions hereinafter set forth.

- (A) On or before the 15th day of October of each year the County Executive shall submit to the County Legislature a tentative budget for the ensuing fiscal year, a capital program for the next six (6) fiscal years, and an accompanying message.
- (B) Henceforth upon the enactment of this local Law on or before the 15th day of October the County Executive shall submit the tentative budget (including both the

operation and maintenance budget and the capital budget) for the ensuing year and the capital program for the ensuing SIX (6) fiscal years, together with an accompanying message to the County Legislature.

Section 4. Publication. The Clerk of the Erie County Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to cause a copy of the foregoing Local Law to be published in the County's official newspapers.

Section 5. Effective Date. This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon the filing with the Secretary of State pursuant to Section 27 of the New York State Municipal Home Rule Law.

**COUNTY EXECUTIVE** 

WHEREAS, pursuant to proceedings heretofore had and taken in accordance with the provisions of Article 5-A of the County Law, including approving orders of the State Comptroller,

County Sewer District No.3 of the County of Erie, New York, has heretofore been established and created on April 9, 1963 (the "District") to provide sewer services to the Village of Orchard Park, most of the Town of Orchard Park, and parts of the Towns of West Seneca and Hamburg; and

WHEREAS, since the 1970s extensions to the District known as the Boston Valley, Armor-McKinley, Blasdell and Holland Extensions were formed; and

WHEREAS, the District and all extensions thereof were consolidated in 2003; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Managers of the District has duly directed that there be prepared a report and estimate of cost by the County Engineers (Erie County Department of Environment and Planning) relating to a proposed increase and improvement of the facilities of the District which report and estimate of cost have been approved by the Board of Managers of the District on December 10, 2003 and filed with the County Legislature pursuant to Section 268 of the County Law; and

WHEREAS, said report and estimate of cost describe a proposed increase and improvement of the facilities of the District, consisting of the reconstruction and/or replacement of approximately 24,500 linear feet of sewer, various pump station upgrades and reconstruction; and the installation and acquisition of process equipment, pumps, meters, controls, lab equipment, and plant reconstruction, as more fully described in the report and estimate of cost hereinbefore referred to; and

WHEREAS, the maximum estimated cost of the aforesaid increase and improvement of the facilities of the District is \$5,000,000, to be apportioned among real properties in the District in accordance with (i) their respective proportionate shares of sewered units in the District, (ii) applicable flat charges, and (iii) assessments against a benefited area which consists of the entire area of said Sewer District No. 3; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 258 of the County Law, as amended by Chapter 397 of the Laws of 1995, the consent of the State Comptroller is not required prior to the construction of said increase and improvement of facilities of the District because the cost thereof to the Typical Property (as defined in the County Law) does not exceed the Average Estimated Cost to the Typical Properties for similar types of expenditures, as computed by the State Comptroller and such cost is \$8.00 for the Town of Hamburg, \$9.35 for the Town of Orchard Park, \$8.40 for the Town of West Seneca, \$6.40 for the Town of Holland, \$9.98 for the Town of Elma, \$9.00 for the Town of Boston, and \$8.55 for the Town of Eden; and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to call a public hearing to consider said increase and improvement in accordance with the provisions of Section 254 of the County Law;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF ERIE, NEW YORK, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. A meeting of the County Legislature of the County of Erie, New York, shall be held at 92 Franklin Street. 2nd Floor. Part 6. Buffalo, New York, in said County, on the 1<sup>ST</sup> day of April 2004, at 1:30 o'clock P.M., Prevailing Time, for the purpose of conducting a public hearing upon the aforesaid proposed increase and improvement of facilities of Erie County Sewer District No.3 in said County, and for such other action on the part of said County Legislature in relation thereto as may be required by law or proper in the premises.

Section 2. The notice of such public hearing shall be in substantially the following form, to-wit:

#### NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a meeting of the County Legislature of the County of Erie, New York, shall be held at 92 Franklin Street. 2nd Floor. Part 6. Buffalo, New York, in said County, on the 1st day of April 2004, at 1:30 o'clock P.M., Prevailing Time, for the purpose of conducting a public hearing upon a proposed increase and improvement of facilities of Erie County Sewer District No. 3 in said County.

The increase and improvement of such facilities consisting of the reconstruction and/or replacement of approximately 24,500 linear feet of sewer, various pump station upgrades and reconstruction; and the installation and acquisition of process equipment, pumps, meters, controls, lab equipment, as more fully described in the report and estimate of cost prepared by the County Engineers (Erie County Department of Environment and Planning) which has been filed with the County Legislature and which has been approved by the Board of Managers of Erie County Sewer District No. 3 on December 10, 2003 (the "Report").

The maximum estimated cost of the aforesaid increase and improvement of the facilities of the District is \$5,000,000, to be apportioned among real properties in the District in accordance with (i) their respective proportionate shares of sewered units in the District, (ii) applicable flat charges, and (iii) assessments against a benefited area which consists of the entire area of said Sewer District No. 3.

The expenditures for such additional increase and improvement of facilities will not cause additional costs for property owners in the District for hook-up fees, and the annual cost of such expenditures to the Typical Property (as defined in the County Law) is \$8.00 for the Town of Hamburg, \$9.35 for the Town of Orchard Park, \$8.40 for the Town of West Seneca, \$6.40 for the Town of Holland, \$9.98 for the Town of Elma, \$9.00 for the Town of Boston, and \$8.55 for the Town of Eden. The County Legislature has heretofore caused to be prepared and filed for public inspection with the Clerk of the Erie County Legislature, a detailed explanation of how such costs were computed, as incorporated in said report and estimate of cost prepared by the County Engineers (Erie County Department of Environment and Planning).

<u>Section 3.</u> The Clerk of said County Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to cause a copy of the Notice of Public Hearing as set forth in Section 2 hereof to be published once in <u>the</u> "<u>Hamburg Sun"</u> and in the "<u>Front Page</u>", the official newspapers of said County, not less than ten nor more than twenty days before the date set herein for said public hearing.

The Clerk is hereby further authorized and directed to file a certified copy of the Notice of Public Hearing with the Comptroller of the State of New York on or about the date of the publication of the Notice of Public Hearing.

WHEREAS, the Legislative Body of Erie County and the Board of Directors of the Erie County Soil and Water Conservation District have previously authorized a municipal agreement on May 10, 2001 at Meeting Number 11, Communication Number 9E-34, for the purpose of performing a County-wide Stream Maintenance Program.

#### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Agreement between the County of Erie and the Erie County Soil and Water Conservation District be increased by an amount of \$20,000 to be allocated from the 2000 Flood Damage Program (SFG 420 –177) and added to the original (\$100,000) Stream Bank Protection Program, for work to reduce erosion and localized flooding related risk to roads, bridges, culverts, and rights-of-way at various locations, and be it further



WHEREAS, the soils/fill management plan in this proposed legislation set clean-up standards that would be protective of human health and the environment and would have allowed the Western New York Brownfield Renewal Area to be utilized for commercial industrial use, and

WHEREAS, verified compliance with the soils/fill management plan would release eligible parties from certain potential liabilities thereby making the risk for taking on such projects more cost effective, and

WHEREAS, this lower cost would contribute to further development of the Western New York Brownfield Renewal Area for commercial industrial use and ultimately economic and job growth in the region, and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Legislature calls upon the NYS Legislature to use the bills of NYS Senator Volker and NYS Assemblyman Higgins from the last legislative session to create a pilot soils/fill management plan program for Erie County and brownfield redevelopment in the area,

WHEREAS, in Spring 2003, the New York State Legislature and Governor approved legislation establishing a clean indoor air law banning smoking from bars and restaurants, and

WHEREAS, the state law took effect in late July 2003, and

WHEREAS, in November 2003, the first fines were levied by the Erie County Department of Health on establishments violating the law, and

WHEREAS, in December 2003, following public criticism, the New York State Department of Health issued rules with criteria allowing establishments to apply for a waiver from the law if they could prove that they lost 15% of their profit due to the law, and

WHEREAS, those state rules applied only to counties without health departments, thus excluding Erie County, and

WHEREAS, in December 2003, after legal challenges from two establishments, the Erie County Health Commissioner agreed to establish county waiver criteria, and

WHEREAS, in late January 2004, the Erie County Health Commissioner issued that criteria – criteria that is viewed as more stringent and restrictive than the state criteria or that of neighboring counties, and

WHEREAS, in that process, the Erie County Health Commissioner has been levying a nonrefundable \$98 fee against each establishment that applies for a waiver, regardless of the success of failure of their application, and

WHEREAS, citing his internal costs to review the waiver applications, the Commissioner has requested permission to levy additional fees on businesses that are not immediately rejected for a waiver and which require additional detailed review by his staff, and

WHEREAS, the state law and the financial constraints and burden imposed on the County of Erie government and its residents represents a significant, additional unfunded mandate from New York State,

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature expresses its concerns and opposition to the unfunded mandate imposed on the retail establishments in this County and on Erie County government by the State of New York, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature requests the County Executive initiate action to recoup reimbursement from New York State for the costs to the County government for administering the Clean Indoor Air Act, including the costs to the County of processing waiver applications and monitoring compliance with the law, and be it further

RESOLVED, that certified copies of this resolution be transmitted to the County Executive, Budget Director, Health Commissioner, Governor, and local delegation of the New York State Legislature.

# A RESOLUTION SUBMITTED BY LEGISLATORS HOLT, SMITH AND DEBENEDETTI

WHEREAS, on January 24, 2002, upon a request from the County Executive, the Erie County Legislature authorized the County Executive and Department of Social Services to enter into a contract with the Center for Governmental Research (CGR) for the purpose of developing a 'Blueprint for Change' for the delivery of human and social services in Erie County, and

WHEREAS, the County of Erie paid \$475,000 for CGR's reports and research which were released in April 2003 and December 2003, and

WHEREAS, the reports concern multiple different County Departments and offices – Social Services, Health, Mental Health, Senior Services, Probation, Youth Detention, Youth Bureau, and the Coordinating Council on Children and Families – many of which have significantly different missions, constituencies and federal and state government funding schemes, and

WHEREAS, in late October 2003, the County Executive told a local daily newspaper that under the Blueprint for Change initiative, he would fundamentally alter the delivery of human and social services in Erie County government through a radical change in County government structure, and

WHEREAS, that complex and wide-sweeping change would apparently take place in two phases; in Phase I in 2004, a new Department for Children, Youth and Families would be created. That department would consolidate early care, youth development, child welfare, and high-need youth services from the Departments of Social Services, Mental Health, Probation/Youth Services and Health into the new department. Also, the Departments of Health and Mental Health would also be merged, and Adult Protective Services and Community Alternative Systems Agency would be moved out of Social Services and into the Department of Senior Services. Further, a new Department for Economic Self-Sufficiency would be created to administer entitlement programs. Youth Detention and Youth Services would be moved from the Department of Probation and Youth Detention Services to the new Department for Children, Youth, and Families. A new "Health and Human Service Cabinet" would also be created, reporting to the Deputy County Executive, and

WHEREAS, according to the County Executive, in Phase II in 2005, a single new Department of Family Services and Community Health would be created, subsuming the Phase I new department, and addressing all health and human services in Erie County. It would consist of five divisions, all downgraded from Departments: Division of Senior Services; Division of Health and Mental Health; Division for Children, Youth, and Families; Division of Economic Self-Sufficiency; and Division of Probation, and

WHEREAS, all of these departments and offices receive federal or state grants which cover administrative and personnel costs, and for which any restructuring of these departments, offices and functions must carefully take into account the impact of these changes on the County's receipt of those federal and state grants, and

WHEREAS, in December 2003, the County Executive communicated to the Legislature his intention to eliminate 147 positions in County government, 101 of which are in the Department of Social Services (DSS) alone, with only 2 of the 147 positions being occupied by a managerial-confidential employee, as part of this "reengineering" initiative, and since that time has terminated his proposal to eliminate the 101 DSS positions, and

WHEREAS, in February 2004, the County Executive appointed Kevin Helfer of the Coordinating Council on Children and Families to the position of Interim Commissioner of Social Services, and

WHEREAS, also in February 2004, a newspaper article cited the County Executive and Interim Commissioner Helfer as saying that the Blueprint for Change initiative would be completed in one year, not two as originally stated, with Phase I skipped entirely and the new Department of Family Services and Community Health created in 2004, and

WHEREAS, throughout this process, there has been little interaction or involvement of the Legislature in these studies and reviews, and in fact, there has been no significant discussion in any Legislature committee concerning these dramatic changes in County government and in the delivery of human and social services to the needy in Erie County, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature supports efforts to more quickly and comprehensively assist children, families, seniors, and all those who require county assistance, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature supports measures that provide quality care and assistance while being cost-effective, and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Honorable Body expresses its concerns that many County employees in social and human service roles, many of whose salaries are significantly reimbursed or paid for by the federal or state governments, may be targeted for position elimination in the Blueprint for Change initiative, and thus threatening the timely delivery of needed services to the needy – an unacceptable outcome – and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature requests that Interim Social Services Commissioner Kevin Helfer, Deputy Commissioner Deborah Merrifield, Susan Davidson of the Coordinating Council on Children and Families, and Mental Health Commissioner Michael Weiner appear at a future meeting of the Legislature's Human Services Committee to provide a thorough briefing and overview of the Blueprint for Change initiative, as well as discuss the County Executive's plans for a restructuring of all County departments and agencies involved in human and social services, and to brief the Legislature if the County Executive intends to award another contract to CGR or any other outside consultant for implementation of the initiative or any other purpose, and be it further

RESOLVED, that certified copies of this resolution be forwarded to Erie County Executive Joel Giambra, Interim Department of Social Services Commissioner Kevin Helfer, Deputy Commissioner Deborah Merrifield, Susan Davidson of the Coordinating Council on Children and Families, and Michael Weiner, Commissioner of Mental Health.

WHEREAS, this suspension of sales tax allowed Erie County to be competitive with surrounding areas with little or no sales tax on clothing and footwear under \$110.00, and

WHEREAS, despite this sales tax suspension, Erie County collected approximately 8% more sales tax in August 2003 when compared with August 2002 and approximately 6% more sales tax in January 2004 when compared with January 2003, and

WHEREAS, NYS has stated that it expects to reinstitute its previous permanent sales tax exemption on clothing and footwear in the near future, and

WHEREAS, it appears that due to the continuing financial uncertainty that pervades the current NYS economy, it is unlikely that NYS will reinstitute its permanent sales tax exemption on clothing and footwear any time soon, and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Legislature would like to urge the NYS Legislature to consider reinstituting its permanent sales tax exemption on clothing and footwear by Fiscal Year 2005-2006, and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Legislature would like to request that NYS once again offer counties the opportunity to participate in sales tax exemption weeks during Fiscal Year 2004-2005, and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Legislature would request that NYS offer counties three (3) sales tax exemption weeks during Fiscal Year 2004-2005,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature does hereby urge the NYS Legislature to consider reinstituting its permanent sales tax exemption on clothing and footwear by Fiscal Year 2005-2006, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature does hereby request that NYS once again offer counties the opportunity to participate in sales tax exemption weeks during Fiscal Year 2004-2005, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature does hereby request that NYS offer counties three (3) sales tax exemption weeks during Fiscal Year 2004-2005, and be it further

RESOLVED, that certified copies of this resolution be sent to Governor Pataki, NYS Department of Taxation and Finance, the Western New York delegation to NYS Legislature, County Executive Giambra, County Comptroller Naples, and Budget Director Passafiume.
