COUNTY OF ERIE Local Law Intro. No. 8 -2004 Local Law No. _____-2004

A LOCAL LAW to create an Employee Suggestion Program in Erie County.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF ERIE, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. DEFINITIONS

- a) SUGGESTION A definite, constructive, original idea, which has been researched and submitted in writing, by an eligible county employee on an Employee Suggestion Program Form, which is intended to result in the more efficient and economical operation of Erie County government.
- b) ELIGIBLE COUNTY EMPLOYEE All full and part.-time employees who are on the active payroll of Erie County government, with the exception of Commissioners, Department Heads, Deputy Commissioners or supervisory employees who job responsibilities call for them to seek methods to improve operations and services.
- c) EMPLOYEE SUGGESTION REVIEW COMMITTEE There shall be an Employee Suggestion Review Committee made up from the Commissioner or their designee from the affected County department, Unit Supervisor, and a department clerical person to track and maintain suggestions and records. Representatives from the Budget Department and a Union Representative will be notified of the meeting and results, but are not required to attend.
- d) EMPLOYEE SUGGESTION AWARD COMMITTEE There shall be an Employee Suggestion Award Committee made up from the Deputy County Executive, affected department Commissioner, Labor Director, Budget Director or their representative and a staff member to maintain records and/or decisions.

Section 2. PROCEDURES

- a) All suggestions shall be submitted on an Employee Suggestion Program Form that has been properly signed and date/time stamped and shall become the exclusive property of the County of Erie. All decisions of the Review Committee and Award Committee shall be final, binding, non-reviewable and non-grieveable, except as provided by the rules and regulations promulgated by the Review Committee and Award Committee under Section 4.
- b) The Review Committee shall have the following powers and duties: to receive and review all suggestions submitted by eligible County employees within 45 days of Employee Suggestion Program Form submission; approve and coordinate the implementation of adopted suggestions; notify the employee of committee's decision; and make recommendations to the Award Committee.
- c) The Award Committee shall have the following powers and duties: review results of the implementation period; and determine and approve awards and recognitions. The decisions are final and binding all decisions are non-grievable.
- d) Members of the Review Committee and Award Committee shall not receive any additional salary or compensation for service as members of these committees.

Section 3. AWARD TO EMPLOYEES

- a) Awards will be based upon the benefit they bring to Erie County. All eligible implemented suggestions will receive consideration for some form of recognition.
- b) The minimum monetary award for a suggestion with either tangible savings or intangible savings will be \$50. There is no maximum amount. The employee can receive 10% of the first year's savings without limit.
- c) Payment will be made to the employee upon verification of annual savings by the Budget Director. The process may take up to one year.
- d) If adoption of a suggestion results in savings to one unit but a loss to another unit, the savings would be offset by the loss. Therefore, no monetary award shall be given in this instance.
- e) Eligible County employees may make joint suggestions with other eligible County employees; however, any award will be divided equally among the employees submitting the suggestion.

Section 4. RULES AND REGULATIONS

a) The Review Committee and the Award Committee shall make such rules and regulations as are lawful, necessary and appropriate for the proper administration of this program as it applies to their respective powers and duties, subject to the provisions of this Laical Law, provided that the Legislature, by simple majority, has not voted to disapprove such rules or regulations within sixty (60) days from the Review Committee and the Award Committee's written notice to the Legislature that such rules or regulations have been promulgated.

Section 5. PROHIBITONS

a) No suggestion shall be considered for an award by the Award Committee unless the suggestion has been submitted to the Review Committee in the manner provided by this Local Law or rules and regulations promulgated by the Review Committee or the Award Committee under Section 4 of this Local Law.

Section 6. SEVERABILITY

a) If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.

COUNTY OF ERIE LOCAL LAW NO. LOCAL LAW INTRO NO. 9 -2004

A LOCAL LAW amending Erie County Local Law Number 5 of 1994, in relation to minorityowned business and woman-owned business utilization commitment by persons or firms contracting with the County of Erie for supplies, materials equipment, insurance, professional, technical or other consultant services.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Short Title This local law shall be known as the Erie County MBE/WBE Utilization Commitment Act, and shall amend, in its entirety, Erie County Local Law number 5 of 1994, to read as set forth herein.

Section 2. Legislative Intent. The Erie County Legislature hereby finds, declares and determines that Erie County residents comprise a diverse workforce consisting of tens of thousands of local residents employed by businesses owned by minorities or women. The Legislature further finds that the existing local law concerning minority business enterprise (MBE) and woman business enterprise (WBE) utilization has been successful toward achieving the goal of equality of opportunity for minority and woman owned businesses offering supplies and materials to the County. It is finally determined and found that MBE/WBE utilization commitment requirements should be extended to contractual agreements for professional, technical or other consultant services.

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Section 3. Definitions. For the purposes of this local law, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

a) A minority business enterprise (MBE) shall mean a business which performs a commercially useful function, at least fifty-one percent (51%) of which is owned by minority group members, with such ownership certified by the Erie County Division of Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO). For the purposes of this paragraph, minority group members: are citizens of the United States who are Native American, African-American, Hispanic and Asian American.

b) A supplier shall mean any person, business, company, entity, or independent contractor seeking to enter into contractual agreements with the County of Erie for the provision of supplies, materials, equipment, insurance, professional technical or other consultant services, in accordance with the bidding procedures, local, state and federal laws governing such agreements.

c) A woman-owned business enterprise (WBE) shall mean a business which performs a commercially useful function, at least fifty-one percent (51%) of which is owned by a woman or women or, in the case of a publicly owned business, at least fifty- one percent (51%) of all stock is owned by a woman or women, with such ownership certified by the Erie County Division of Equal Employment Opportunity.

Section 4. Provisions and conditions. The following provisions shall be inserted in and made a condition of all bid specifications and/or Requests for Qualifications or Proposals (RFQ or RFP) prepared by Erie County or its agents for supplies, materials, equipment, insurance, or professional, technical or other consultant services, involving a gross expenditure of more than \$15,000

MINORITY AND WOMEN-OWNED BUSINESS UTILIZATION COMMITMENT

A. The supplier of all purchase contracts involving an expenditure of more than \$15,000 shall take reasonable steps to provide equal opportunity to such firms and organizations to contract with the County through the utilization of a bona fide minority business enterprise (MBE) and women business enterprises (WBE) on all contracts including entering into sub-contracts with MBE/WBE firms, with Erie County. Reasonable action shall include, but not be limited to:

- 1) Utilizing a source list of MBEs and WBEs;
- 2) Solicitation of bids, RFQs and RFPs from MBEs .and WBEs;
- 3) Providing MBEs and WBEs sufficient time to submit proposals in response to solicitations;
- 4) Maintaining records showing utilization of MBEs and/or WBEs, as well as the specific efforts to identify and utilize these companies.
- 5) A policy goal of awarding at least ten percent (10%) of the total dollar value of the County's contribution to a contract to MBEs and at least two percent (2%) of the total dollar value of the County's contribution to a contract to WBEs or, for those contracts governed by federal or state regulations with respect to MBE and/ or WBE hiring, the prevailing percentage set forth therein, whichever is higher, subject to waiver as provided below;
- 6) Entering into sub-contracts with MBE/WBE firms" if appropriate and feasible to effectuate the policy goal set forth herein; and

7) Building the capacity of local and regional MBE and/or WBE firms to provide quality technical and professional services.

B. All suppliers, all bidders or proposers on each contract subject to this law shall submit to the Erie County Division of Equal Employment Opportunity, with the bid or proposal, a list of all MBEs and WBEs from whom the supplier has solicited bids or proposals, or with whom the supplier has signed a binding contractual agreement, for the purposes of meeting the MBE and WBE utilization goals provided in subdivision A (5) above. A supplier's bid or proposal shall not be considered where the supplier fails to submit a list of MBEs and WBEs as provided for herein. A supplier's bid or proposal shall not be considered where examination of said list of MBEs and WBEs evidences failure by the supplier to comply with the policy requirements provided herein, except that the legislature, with written concurrence from the Erie County Division of Equal Employment Opportunity, may grant a complete or partial waiver of the provisions of subdivision A (5) herein, in accordance with Section 6 of this Local Law.

C. As evidence of reasonable compliance with the policy goals set forth in subdivision A (5) above, the supplier shall submit to the Director of Purchasing, at the bid opening, or the head of the procuring department at the beginning of the RFQ/RFP deliberations, a schedule for MBE and WBE participation listing the MBEs and WBEs whom the supplier intends to utilize; specifying the agreed upon price to be paid for such goods or services and identifying in detail the contract item or items to be supplied or performed by each MBE and WBE. A copy of the participating schedule will be forwarded to the Erie County Division of Equal Employment Opportunity from the Division of Purchasing or the procuring Department. Contingent upon a contract award, a letter of intent to enter into a purchase agreement, signed by both the supplier and/or MBE/WBE, indicating the agreed upon price and scope of work, shall be provided.

D. As evidence of good faith efforts to attain the goals set forth in subdivision A (5) above, the supplier shall provide to the Erie County Division of Equal Employment Opportunity, copies of all the subcontracts and/or purchase agreements with the MBEs and WBEs within fifteen (15) days of contract award.

E. The Erie County Division of Equal Employment Opportunity reserves the prerogative to interpret the Local Law and to verify the Contractor's compliance or non-compliance with this Local Law.

Section 5. Applicability to contractual agreements for professional, technical or other consultant services. Notwithstanding any other application, this local law shall apply to any and all contractual agreements for professional, technical or other consultant services made in accordance with Section 19.08 of the Erie County Administrative Code. Waiver of Section 19.08, in accordance with the Erie County Legislature's authority to make a finding of necessity that the special service or skill must be provided immediately, or a determination that the procedure is impracticable, shall not constitute waiver of the provisions of subdivision 4A(5) of this local law.

Section 6. Waiver. The County, through the Erie County Division of Equal Employment Opportunity, upon written request by the supplier and subject to the authorization of the legislature by resolution, may grant a complete or partial waiver of the provisions of Section 4A(5) where the

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availability of MBEs and/or WBEs in the market area of the contract is less than the ten percent (10%) MBE goal and the two percent (2%) WBE goal. However, the supplier must illustrate good faith efforts in its attempts to reach the policy goals.

Section 7. Public hearing and annual report. The Legislature shall conduct annual public hearings to assess the impact and effect of this local law, and shall receive an annual report from the Erie County Division of Equal Employment Opportunity specific to the County's MBE/WBE utilization commitment on or before March 1 of each succeeding year.

Section 8. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this local law shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such adjudication shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, or section thereof directly involved in the proceeding or action in which such adjudication has been rendered.

Section 9. Effective Date. This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State pursuant to Section 27 of the New York State Municipal Home Rule Law.

A RESOLUTION SUBMITTED BY LEGISLATOR HOLT

WHEREAS, given the many rail lines, switching yards and rail facilities in Erie County, many of which are near residential neighborhoods, the safe and efficient operation of railroad locomotives is of the utmost importance and concern to our community, and

WHEREAS, many railroads have begun ordering their engineers, conductors and brakemen to operate locomotives in reverse and in many other instances have begun employing remotecontrolled locomotives, and

WHEREAS, the operators of remote-controlled locomotives have only two weeks of training whereas rail engineers have one year of training prior to becoming full engineers, and

WHEREAS, remote-controlled locomotives have been involved in numerous episodes involving the derailment of rail cars, with the federal regulatory agency, the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) noting that at July 2003, there had been at least 60 accidents involving remote-controlled locomotives in switching yards in the U.S., and

WHEREAS, in February 2004, at a CSX switching yard in Cheektowaga, a remotecontrolled locomotive derailed eight rail cars, including three containing liquid propane, and

WHEREAS, in February 2003, a CSX trainman was killed near Syracuse in a switching yard while remote-controlled cars were being moved by his partner, and

WHEREAS, at least 59 city governments across the United States, including Baton Rouge, La.; Detroit, Mich.; Shreveport, La.; Boston, Mass.; Cleveland, Ohio; North Little Rock, Ark.; Bakersfield, Calif.; Woodbridge, N.J.; Maple Heights, Ohio; Evansville, Ind.; Flint, Mich.; Sparks, Nev.; Commerce, Calif.; Clinton, Iowa; Montebello, Calif.; Saginaw, Mich.; Mankato, Minn.; St. Louis, Mo.; Central City, Ill.; Carteret, N.J.; Toledo, Ohio; San Francisco, Calif.; Houston, Texas; Janesville, Wisc.; South Salt Lake City, Utah; and Fort Madison, Iowa, and seventeen counties including Douglas County, Wisc.; West Baton Rouge Parish (County), La.; Point Coupee Parish (County), La.; Cuyahoga County, Ohio; Huron County, Ohio; Erie County, Ohio; Whitley County, Ky.; Unicoi County, Tennessee; Contra Costa County, Calif.; Knox County, Tenn.; Clinton County, Iowa; Roanoke County, Va.; Harris County, Texas; Greenup, Ky.; San Francisco, Calif.; Champaign

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County, Ill.; and Beaver County, Utah have approved local resolutions opposing the use of remotecontrolled locomotives in their jurisdictions, citing safety issues, and

WHEREAS, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen, which represents employees federally licensed to move and operate locomotives in the United States, opposes the use of remote-controlled locomotives, citing safety and other concerns, and

WHEREAS, the New York State Assembly has introduced A.5701, a bill to amend the railroad law, to prohibit the operation of railroad locomotives in reverse (in certain situations) and to govern and regulate the use of remote-controlled locomotives to protect the public's safety and well-being, as well as that of engineers, conductors, brakemen, and trainmen,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature does hereby join the other county legislative bodies and city legislative bodies across the United States, in calling for restrictions on reverse-operated locomotives and remote-controlled locomotives, as specified in A.5701, and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Honorable Body hereby expresses its support for A.5701, calls on the State Assembly to pass such legislation, the State Senate to approve companion legislation, and the Governor to sign said legislation into law, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the FRA is hereby urged to ban the use of remote-controlled locomotives in local switching yards until appropriate safety concerns are addressed in consultation with engineers, conductors, brakemen and trainmen, including the following:

- # Any railroad operating a remotely-controlled locomotive must notify the Erie County Department of Emergency Services before implementing such operations,
- # Remotely-controlled locomotives should not transport, move, or switch cars with hazardous materials, wastes, and/or liquids on or near tracks occupied by cars with hazardous materials,
- ## Remotely-controlled locomotives should not operate over or under a public or private rail crossing or bridge without an appropriate person in the cab with the appropriate federal training and skills to operate and stop the locomotive,
- # Trains that consist of one or more remotely-operated locomotives should be equipped with a clearly-marked external device outside of the operating compartment that is capable of stopping the locomotive and train in the case of an emergency,
- ## Trains that consist of one or more remotely-operated locomotives should be equipped with devices that secure the operating cab and its controls against terrorists, vandals and any other unauthorized persons, and
- ## An effective track-related mechanical device should be developed and installed to stop a remotelycontrolled train or locomotive in the event of a runaway train

And be it further

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RESOLVED, that certified copies of this resolution be transmitted to Betty Monro, Acting Administrator of the Federal Railroad Administration (1120 Vermont Avenue NW, Washington, DC 20590), Don M. Hahs, National President of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen and International President of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers (1370 Ontario Street Mezzanine, Cleveland, OH 44113), the local congressional delegation, Governor George Pataki, the local delegation of the New York State Legislature.
