WHEREAS, the Department of Social Services is able to acquire ten licenses to HMIS for five years from HAWNY at a cost of \$500 per license per year; and

WHEREAS, HAWNY is willing to develop new reports on HAWNY needed to monitor performance at a cost of \$2,500; and

WHEREAS, HMIS allows housing and service providers to enter client and services information into a secure web-based database; and

WHEREAS, HMIS is an important tool to capture the extent of homelessness as well as the demographic characteristics of persons who are either homeless or at risk of becoming homeless; and

WHEREAS, there are no new or additional requirements as a result of accepting these funds.

Tax Assistance (VITA) Centers

& Events (INTRO. 11-6)

A RESOLUTION TO BE SUBMITTED BY LEGISLATORS MEYERS, BASKIN, BRUSO, HARDWICK & JOHNSON

WHEREAS, the United States has widespread low voter turnout and one barrier to voting is the voter registration process; and

WHEREAS, in 2014, the Pew Research Center estimated that 21.4% of the voting-eligible population was not registered to vote; and

WHEREAS, more than 150 million American households file their income taxes every year; and

WHEREAS, given the American tradition of associating taxation with representation, some analysts have indicated that there may be benefits to linking tax filing with voter registration as tax-paying reminds all filers of the significance of public policy for their daily lives and livelihoods, which might increase interest in political participation through voting; and

WHEREAS, voter registration at tax-filing time might also have the potential to help make the voting population more closely mirror the citizenry as a whole, as low-income Americans are substantially less likely to be registered to vote than higher-income Americans, and are also less likely to actually vote; and

WHEREAS, millions of low-income Americans file their tax returns every year and income tax filing is critical for many working families who rely on the Earned Income and Child Tax Credits to supplement their incomes, thus offering an opportunity to engage these persons and encourage their participation in registering to, and then actually voting; and

WHEREAS, a study involving the Brookings Institution was conducted in Dallas, Texas and Cleveland, Ohio from January-April 2018 to test a hypothesis that engaging non-registered voters through events in which lower-income persons receive free assistance to prepare their federal and state income taxes could spur more voter registrations and voter engagement; and

WHEREAS, the "Filer Voter" experiment was conducted at local Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) centers coordinated by local or regional nonprofit community organizations, and using IRS-certified VITA volunteer tax preparers who help low- and moderate-income Americans making less than \$55,000 per year to prepare and file their income taxes; and

WHEREAS, a major advantage of the Filer Voter program is its very low cost because it builds on an existing program (VITA) and for organizations looking to increase voter registration in their communities without the costs associated with canvassing and tabling efforts, a Filer Voter program would likely be very efficient when VITA partners with local community agencies or the local government administering elections and voter registration; and

WHEREAS, the Brookings Institution study found that the Filer Voter program in Cleveland and Dallas significantly increased voter registration rates among unregistered persons and more than doubled the likelihood of an unregistered person registering to vote, with, for instance, in the 2018 Ohio primary election, 23% of those who newly registered to vote through the Filer Voter program actually voted, a rate slightly higher than the overall turnout for the state, 21%; and

WHEREAS, the study reported that if the experience of the Filer Voter pilot program in Dallas and Cleveland were replicated at VITA programs nationwide, 115,000 unregistered eligible voters may register to vote, including 63,000 people who would not otherwise register, which should be applauded and encouraged for civic participation.

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature expresses its support for the intention and rationale behind the Filer Voter initiative in the Brookings Institution study, and expresses our support for efforts in Erie County to explore a partnership between local Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program coordinators, not-for-profit community partners, and the Erie County Board of Elections to help reach unregistered persons, and register them to vote to help spur voter turnout in elections; and be it further

RESOLVED, that certified copies of this resolution shall be transmitted to the Erie County Commissioners of Elections, the League of Women Voters Buffalo/Niagara, and the local Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) coordinators and partners in Erie County.

WHEREAS, the Erie County Department of Public Works (DPW), Division of Highways wishes to further its new practice of renting various pieces of equipment, to provide the County with specialized equipment and training, as needed, for winter/seasonal work and other unique emergency situations; and

WHEREAS, an RFP was prepared to select the best vendor to contract with to continue with the rental option; and

WHEREAS, CaHill, LLC, a Women's Business Enterprise (WBE) business tied to Milton CAT in Batavia, NY, a sole source Caterpillar equipment dealer in Western New York, was the chosen respondent after review of their submittal; and

WHEREAS, Legislative approval is needed for the County Executive to enter into a three year agreement with CaHill, LLC, with the option of two one year renewals; and

WHEREAS, there is the option of adding additional types of equipment, as needed at any time, which would add additional rental/training charges for the specialized equipment, with the possibility of the need to purchase specialized accessories for the equipment throughout the various seasons or for unique emergency situations throughout the year; and

WHEREAS, renting gives the advantage of using the latest reliable technology and equipment while eliminating service costs, minimizing downtime, and through this agreement with CaHill provides training for Erie County Highway staff to perform "Do It With Me" maintenance, a customer service agreement in which the customer performs a portion of the service and the vendor performs the balance (e.g. the customer performs service every 250, 500, and 750 hours of machine use and the vendor performs service every 1,000 or 2,000 hours); and

WHEREAS, the rented equipment features Tier 4 fuel efficiency, which provides an estimated fuel cost savings of 15%, VisionLink and Geofencing capabilities for increased oversight of operations by managing equipment location, usage and security, and a new feature, the quick-hitch coupler and hydraulic attachment components for multi-attachment uses; and

WHEREAS, in the event that there is a declared disaster, the geo-fence and Global Positioning System (GPS) enabled equipment will allow clear and transparent tracking for the full 100 percent reimbursement of rental costs that Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) normally pays compared to the prorated hourly rate reimbursement for equipment that is owned by the County.

WHEREAS, Legislative approval is needed to transfer the necessary funds over \$10,000 into GL Account 545000 – Rental Charges, Funds Center 1231010, Fund 210 to cover necessary rental charges.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature does hereby authorize the County Executive to enter into a three year agreement with the option for two one year renewals with CaHill, LLC a Women's Business Enterprise (WBE) business tied to Milton CAT in Batavia, NY, a sole source Caterpillar equipment dealer in Western, for the rental of various pieces of equipment and purchase of specialized accessories, as needed, to provide the County with specialized equipment, for winter/seasonal work and other unique emergency situations; and be it further
