WHEREAS, 2019 Aid and Incentives for Municipalities (AIM) funding has been eliminated from almost every town and village in New York State pursuant to the 2019 budget; and

WHEREAS, this honorable body opposed the AIM cuts prior to their inclusion in the finalized and approved version of New York State's 2019 Budget; and

WHEREAS, Governor Cuomo, after passing the 2019 Budget, approved additional legislation that would reimburse towns and villages by directing the Office of the State Comptroller (OSC) to withhold certain sales taxes levied by counties and redirect them to the towns and villages who lost out on AIM funding. This effectively transferred the burden of funding the AIM cuts from New York State to the counties; and

WHEREAS, despite the intent to protect all towns and villages from the AIM cuts certain counties, like Erie and Nassau, cannot have their taxes, interest and penalties diverted; and

WHEREAS, both Eire and Nassau have fiscal stability boards which dictate where some taxes, interests, and penalties collected by the counties can be spent. In this case, the taxes and fees that could be siphoned off by OSC may only be directed to the Erie County Fiscal Stability Board, which must then distribute them back to the county for certain predesignated sharing obligations; and

WHEREAS, this process leaves no money to be distributed by OSC and should be addressed to the benefit of Erie County's towns and villages.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that this honorable body hereby calls on the New York State Division of Budget, Governor Andrew Cuomo, and New York State Comptroller Thomas P. DiNapoli to address this situation prior to the December 15th deadline to make Erie County's towns and villages whole; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this honorable body implores Governor Cuomo and the New York State Legislature to restore AIM funding to previous levels going forward and to not place the burden of providing AIM funding on counties; and be it further

RE: Authorization to Accept USDOJ Grant Improving Re-Entry Services for Adults with Co-Occurring Substance Abuse & Mental Illness (COMM. 21E-14)

WHEREAS, since 2016, the Erie County Reentry Coalition has engaged in a strategic planning process to strengthen reentry services in the county. The coalition, composed of over 80 stakeholders including government agencies, service providers, educational institutions, foundations, and individuals with lived experience -- identified as its top priority establishing a one-stop reentry center to expand and better coordinate reentry services particularly for those incarcerated in the county's two jails; and

WHEREAS, the Community Foundation Greater Buffalo's Racial Equity Roundtable initiated the re-entry planning process. The Roundtable, whose membership includes prominent government, business, faith and foundation leaders, is committed to ensuring that all communities in Erie County benefit from the growth of the region. Erie County Department of Mental Health (ECDMH) Commissioner Michael Ranney and ECSO Superintendent Thomas Diina co-chair the coalition's steering committee; and

WHEREAS, the Re-entry Coalition was a vital part of finding and applying for the grant; and

WHEREAS, will implement universal screenings for criminogenic risk, mental illness, and substance use disorders to the over 12,000 individuals booked into the jails annually. In each of three years of program implementation and following 12-months of planning, fifty individuals assessed at the highest risk to recidivate and with the most significant Cutaneous Sarcoidosis Activity and Morphology Instrument (CSAMI) will be identified at booking and will begin receiving pre-release collaborative comprehensive case management services, participate in evidenced-based treatment programs, and receive coordinated discharge planning with licensed community-based providers; and

WHEREAS, individuals with CSAMI are consistently over-represented in the criminal justice system. Research estimates that roughly 68% of adults in US jails experience chemical dependency or diagnosed with substance abuse disorders (SUD). Of these, 72% of inmates also had a serious co-occurring mental disorder; and

WHEREAS, in May 2019, ECDMH reported similar rates for the jail population -- 56.7% were diagnosed with mental health conditions, and of these, an estimated 77% were diagnosed with co-occurring SUD; and

WHEREAS, many of those with CSAMI were frequent users of the jail and public health resources; and

WHEREAS, in 2014, the one-year recidivism rate among offenders with mental illness was over 50%, with multiple individuals having more than 18 arrests. These individuals also faced other challenges, including, homelessness, unemployment, re-hospitalization, increased prevalence of psychotic symptoms, depression suicidality, high rates of chronic illnesses such as hepatitis C, violence, and a lack of community-based care management that can facilitate community transition; and

WHEREAS, in the jail and post-release, the initiative utilizes MISSION-CJ (Maintaining Independence and Sobriety through Systems Integration, Outreach, and Networking - Criminal Justice), a Substance Abuse and Mental Health Service Administration (SAMSHA) developed an evidence-based practice for the treatment of individuals with co-occurring disorders at every intercept point along the continuum from arrest to community supervision. It is currently used by the county's Adult Treatment Court and in Buffalo Police Department crisis intervention diversionary programs; and

WHEREAS, MISSION-CJ aims to assist individuals who have a reduced ability to remain stable and avoid further justice involvement and includes a framework for exploring and acknowledging criminogenic factors, addressing co-occurring mental health and substance use treatments, and linking clients to community-based supports to sustain recovery and reduce recidivism; and WHEREAS, the initiative leverages a new re-entry center located in Buffalo adjacent to the jail which, will be opened in December 2019. Tentatively called Service Link Stop (SLS), the center is supported by a network of reentry providers, and program participants will receive services and attend programs after their release from jail; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. DOJ Bureau of Justice Assistance's Federal Second Chance Act approved the vendors for this grant and are as followed: BestSelf Behavioral Treatment Services, the University at Buffalo Primary Care Institute, and Texas Christian University; and

WHEREAS, authorization is required from the Erie County Legislature for the County Executive to enter into a contract with the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs Bureau of Justice Assistance Second Chance Act in the amount of \$1,000,000.00 and to enter into two separate four-year agreements with BestSelf and the University of Buffalo; and

WHEREAS, the grant will reimburse the County for personnel, fringe benefits, travel to training seminars, and supplies; and

WHEREAS, the Sheriff's Office is not creating a new position, instead a current Sergeant level position will be assigned to the program and will spend 100% of the position's time overseeing the project during the first year planning period and the following three year implementation period; this individual is already assigned to reentry programs to help facilitate the program; and

WHEREAS, the ECSO will assign an appropriate staffer member who will participate in the screening and providing referrals to the program. The position will spend 5% of its time during the first budget planning year which will rise to 12% in each of the following three implementation years; and

WHEREAS, an ECSO Correctional Classification Specialist, will assist in administering assessments and screenings, referrals, and determining eligibility of inmates for the program.
