

- 56% of COVID-19 hospitalizations are age 64 & under





• Of 210 reported COVID-19 associated deaths during April 1 - August 19, 2021, 92% (193) were among persons who were not fully vaccinated against COVID-19 prior to infection.

• COVID-19 associated deaths in August 2021 already surpass those in July 2021.

#### **DELTA VARIANT**

- Delta is different from previous strains
  - Highly contagious (2x original U.S. strains)
  - May be more severe
  - Breakthrough vaccinated and unvaccinated cases may have same level of transmission risk
- Vaccines prevent >90% of severe disease and may be less effective at preventing infection or transmission
  - Therefore, more breakthrough and more community spread despite vaccination
- Non-pharmaceutical interventions (i.e., masks, social distancing) essential to prevent continued spread with current vaccine coverage



## NEW COVID-19 CASES AND HOSPITALIZATIONS AMONG ADULTS, BY VACCINATION STATUS — NYS, 5/3/21–7/25/21

- During 5/3/21–7/25/21, overall age-adjusted vaccine effectiveness (VE) against hospitalization in NYS was relatively stable (91.9%–95.3%).
- The overall age-adjusted vaccine effectiveness against infection for all NY adults \$\psi\$ from 91.7% to 79.8%.





COVID-19 Vaccination: Vaccination is currently the leading public health prevention strategy to end the COVID-19 pandemic Promoting vaccination can help schools safely continue in-person learning as well as extracurricular activities and sports. Fully vaccinated individuals will not be subject to the same quarantine requirements as those who are not fully vaccinated in most circumstances.
- COVID-19 Screening Testing: COVID-19 screening testing is recommended for students and staff
  who are not fully vaccinated at heart once per week during moderate, substantial, and high
  strammission as per CDC guidance. ECDOH continues to work with schools to implement COVID-19
  screening testing programs to those intrested.
- 10. Cleaning and Disinfection: In general, cleaning once a day sufficiently removes potential virus that may be on surface. Disinfecting (using disinfectant on the U.S. Environmental Protection Aparcy) removes any remaining genes on surface, which further reloase any thick of practing infection. If a facility has had a sick person or someone who tested positive for COVID-19 within the last 24 hours, clean AND disinfect the space.
- 11. Vestilation: ECDOH encourages improving ventilation (HVAC and air filtration systems), bringing fresh outdoor air into buildings, opening multiple doors and windows, and using child-safe fam. During transportation, open or crack windows in buses and other forms of transportation, if doing so does not pose a safety risk.



Guidance: COVID-19 Vaccination Guidance for People who are Pregnant, Lactating, or Planning to Become Pregnant

- Centers for Disease Control & Prevention (CDC), the American College of Obstetricians &
  Gynecologists (ACOG) and the Society for Maternal-Fetal Medicine (SMFM) recommend that all
  pregnant individuals be vaccinated against COVID-19.
- This recommendation is based on analysis of safety data on 2,500 women receiving the COVID-19 vaccine. This analysis showed no increased risk of miscarriage for those who received at least one dose of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccine before 20 weeks of pregnancy.
- Vaccination of pregnant people against COVID-19 also serves to build antibodies which may protect their baby from COVID-19 infection.
- No one should be denied access to a COVID-19 vaccine simply because they are pregnant, planning to be pregnant, or lactating.
- People who are pregnant, planning to be pregnant, and/or lactating are not required to consult
  with a healthcare provider prior to being vaccinated and do not need to provide proof of
  permission from a healthcare provider to get vaccinated.
- People who are pregnant, planning to be pregnant, and/or lactating may receive any of the three COVID-19 vaccines currently authorized by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for emergency use.
- Data has shown that pregnant people are more likely to experience severe complications and
  even death when infected with COVID-19 compared with non-pregnant people. Severe illness
  includes illness that requires hospitalization, intensive care, or a ventilator or special equipment
  to breathe, or illness that results in death. Additionally, pregnant people with COVID-19 might
  be at increased risk of adverse pregnancy outcomes, such as preterm birth, compared with
  pregnant women without COVID-19. Getting a COVID-19 vaccine during pregnancy can help
  protect you from severe illness from COVID-19.

#### **Children's Work Group Meeting Activities**

- **Poll:** Attendees were polled about their interest in returning to in-person meetings. With the caveat that any inperson meeting would abide by the social distancing and masking requirements of the venue in which it is held, the majority of the respondents (8/12) voted yes to in-person meetings, with 1/12 voting no and 3/12 not responding to the poll.
- Who Needs to be at the Table: Each Subgroup was given a document on the shared drive listing out the missing groups/people identified during the very first Live Well Erie Task Force meeting. Members identified what organizations, businesses, and individuals were missing from the room and who we needed to be invited into the process in order to advance our goals and contribute to our work.
- Continued Review of Initiatives/Goals: Workgroup members of each subgroup were urged to consider the multiple indicators and to not limit themselves to working on the indicator which was chosen by previous meeting attendees if the current meeting attendees have interest or expertise in a different indicator.
- Continued Work on Logic Model:
  - Goal Group #1 Children will Grow Up in a Safe, Stable, and Supportive Community: Improve services by implementing evidence-based models including trauma informed care and strengthening families
  - Goal Group #2 Children will achieve comprehensive health: Focus on childhood obesity
  - Goal Group #3 Children will realize their greatest potential: TBD

- COVID Major Focus for last year
  - Decided on Four Committees- Transportation, Mental Health, Nutrition, Financial Security
  - Some Committees are working on more than one goal

  - Several collaborative grant applications have developed from these connections



#### **SUPPORTING OUR SENIORS**

- Full Committee met two time since last implementation team meeting.
  - Discussion phased re-opening of senior centers, success of the Go & Dine Program and Frozen meal delivery program, working on the Complete Streets initiative, anti-stigma trainings around older adults and mental health and we developed a Medicaid 101 training.
  - We are looking for more members, particularly from community organizations and nonprofits that work with older adults
  - Good time to join the committee as we are re-evaluating our goals/strategies to see if there is alignment with what other CBO's are working on as we head into 2022.



#### **SUPPORTING OUR SENIORS**

- Major summer Project was the Elder Law Virtual Summer Series.
  - This is the second time as a virtual event.
  - 12 presentations/16 presenters.
  - Legal topics included: scams, evictions, stimulus check FAQ, kinship care, Medicaid, elder abuse and the new POA law280 attendees liveall videos on Senior Services website:
