# **May 14th Shooting Tragedy Response**

Saturday, May 14, 2022 was a tranquil day tragically marred by a racist, hate-filled shooting spree at Tops Market on Jefferson Avenue that left ten dead, several wounded and a community shaken. On site within 40 minutes of the shooting, Erie County Executive Poloncarz immediately issued a call for mental health and social-emotional support for families and neighborhood community members, as well as responding to the creation of a "food asset" and activated numerous county departments to assist. In addition to the County Executive, the Deputy County Executive and Commissioner of Personnel responded while the Commissioner of Mental Health organized a team of community provider responders from Crisis Services, Spectrum Human Services, Endeavor Health and BestSelf Behavioral Health. This team immediately coalesced to provide on-site mental health first aid and multiple other measures of comfort and support.

The following day the County Executive and Deputy County Executive were on-site to lead a team of Live Well Erie responders, including the personnel mentioned above, with the invaluable addition of the Director of the Office of Health Equity and members of the County Executive's administrative team. This group, with the support of the Erie County Health Department and Department of Social Services, opened the first post-shooting support center at the Johnnie B. Wiley Sports Complex on Jefferson Avenue. Supporting their efforts were local community-based organizations such as the American Red Cross Disaster team, the NYS Office of Victim's Assistance (OVA), the NY Office of Mental Health, Say Yes Buffalo and Feedmore of WNY. In the weeks and months that followed, food distribution as well as social and emotional support flowed from that and other locations.

Community-driven self-help became an integral part of the healing journey in the affected neighborhood and the greater East Buffalo communities of color. Local and trusted health, mental health and support personnel emerged to partner with the Live Well Erie team to bring long-term relief and healing to the community impacted by this racist attack. Supported by federal, state and local resources, including the Erie County District Attorney's Office of Victim's Assistance, the Buffalo United Resiliency Center (BURC) was incorporated at the Resource Council to coordinate long-term healing initiatives that were community-driven and culturally-informed, providing economic, social, emotional and logistical supports in traditional and non-traditional ways. Now under the leadership of the Buffalo Urban League and the Community Health Center of Buffalo, the BURC continues to provide support to the families and communities affected by the shooting. Funding is provided by the OVA and NYS Office of Mental Health. A Steering Committee of community stakeholders working with Erie County, the City of Buffalo and NYS government partners ensures these supports are ongoing and tailored to the needs and wishes of local recipients.

# 2. Empowering Working Families

### **Mission Statement:**

Our ALICE (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) families will achieve a sustainable standard of living and thriving quality of life.

### **Activity Summary Section:**

The Working Families working group identified 1-2 strategies per goal for the 2022 year. In addition to streamlining or redefining the existing strategies, we also added a fourth goal, focusing on access to transportation and mobility; the connecting tissue of all the working families working group goals.

In June of 2022, Erie County hosted a first of its kind Housing Summit, where we brought together municipal officials across Erie County and many affordable housing developers. The goal of the Summit was to bring together developers and local officials with the goal of advancing and supporting development of affordable housing projects in the future. Following the Housing Summit, Erie County's Department of Environment and Planning staff have been working closely with 11 municipalities who have expressed interest in developing affordable housing. We have brought together as many as eight affordable housing developers with municipal and New York State officials to work on project locations, cost and feasibility for potential projects. The Live Well Erie Workforce Development Pilot Project launched in April of 2022. This program effectively brings together available Workforce Development community resources and supports them through a set of short-term up-skilling opportunities, wraparound and supplemental services. Through the support of the Innovation Fund, the two-year pilot program will directly support 100-200 participants in the five leading WNY industry sectors: Manufacturing, Health Care, Hospitality, Business/Customer Service and Technology. The Innovation Fund is designed to address the participants' social determinates of health and further the goals and objectives of the Live Well Erie initiatives.

### Live Well Erie Childcare Task Force:

As previously reported, the LWE Emergency Childcare Task Force (ECTF) worked hard during the pandemic. In 2020 and 2021, the Task Force coalesced to ensure essential workers had access to childcare, childcare providers had the supplies and support they needed to continue providing service, and elementary school children had a safe place to go during the many months of virtual school.

In 2022, however, the LWE ECTF made a critical pivot away from addressing pandemic-related emergency needs and turning instead toward the bigger picture analyzing and advocating for a fundamental change to the structure of childcare in NYS. As reported in the 2021 LWE Annual Report, the ECTF partnered with Cornell University to study the actual cost of childcare in Erie County at both existing wage rates for childcare providers and at wage rates actually commensurate with the level of training childcare providers are required to maintain.

# **Partner Highlights:**

### **Center for Elder Law & Justice:**

The Center for Elder Law & Justice (CELJ) is a nonprofit law office incorporated in 1978 with sole support from Erie County Senior Services through a grant of \$100,000. At the time, CELJ was part of The Legal Aid Bureau and Erie County saw the benefit of creating a legal services agency to focus exclusively on the issues impacting older adults. CELJ now has offices in Buffalo, Dunkirk, Olean, and Lockport, providing direct services in eleven WNY counties and policy and impact litigation benefiting older adults throughout New York State. Although their free services helped 23,000 people last year (through direct services, legal clinics, outreach and help from our volunteer attorneys), the vast majority of their clients and community partners reside in Erie County. They work within both the aging and legal services advocacy communities and their mission is to use the legal system to allow their clients to age independently and with dignity.

Karen Nicolson, CEO of CELJ, serves as the Live Well Erie Co-Chair for Older Adults and continues to be an integral part of Live Well Erie. They have been a proud partner since inception and are eager to continue to help every resident of Erie County achieve his or her full potential.



# **Partner Highlights:**

### **Belmont Housing Resources:**

Belmont Housing Resources (BHR) of Buffalo is a vital agency in our community providing housing related assistance to the residents of Erie County. They focus on providing safe and affordable housing opportunities to first time homebuyers through their housing redevelopment projects and homebuyer workshop programs. Building financial capacity helps families and individuals to achieve their long-term goals. Its multiple educational offerings include finding affordable rental opportunities, buying a home, financial management, foreclosure prevention, home maintenance, and energy efficiency. This knowledge empowers, energizes, and boosts individuals on their path to financial security.

Through Belmont's administration of both the HUD Section 8 voucher program, and the VASH (Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing) vouchers, they help secure affordable rental housing for families, seniors, and veterans. They also professionally manage 21 rental properties throughout Western New York for seniors, families, and individuals with disabilities They strive to help empower individuals with the knowledge they need to keep their homes healthy and safe. Through the Green and Healthy Homes Initiative, they are able to provide free education programs to qualifying households. They are also committed to our partnership with the City of Buffalo in implementing the Lead Hazard Control Program here in WNY. Erie County partners with BHR's to provide Housing Counseling services to low income residents.

The study findings were presented in the form of a weekly gap—i.e. the gap between the existing subsidy rate (set by NYS and paid to providers on behalf of qualifying families) and the actual cost of care. You can see this gap in the charts below:

The top chart reports the approximate gap between current subsidy rates and current costs of care.

The bottom chart reports the approximate gap between current subsidy rates and costs of care if all workers earned \$25/hour for full-time and \$20/hour for part-time work.

This senario would allow providers to begin implementing their number one proiority of raising staff wages, and could begin to address worker shortages in child care.

# NYS Child Care Market Subsidy Rates for Erie County: 2021-2022 (Effective June 1, 2022)

In late 2022, the pivot away from the pandemic emergency continued and the ECTF was formally dissolved, bringing its members under the umbrella of the LWE Working Families Working Group, which has access to safe, affordable childcare as a goal. A subcommittee exclusively focused on this goal was formed and is chaired by former members of the ECTF.

### List of Priorities for 2023:

- Increase the production of affordable housing units in Erie County Families will have greater financial security
- Increase federal Home Investment Partnership (HOME) funding from HUD to continue to build new units of affordable rental housing
- Educate municipal Planning Boards on strategies to increase affordable housing in their municipalities
- Undertake a new study in partnership with Cornell University to explore research questions addressing issues related to both providers and parents as an essential component in ensuring NYS childcare policy meaningfully addresses the childcare challenges in NYS
- Redefining walkability, mobility and access through the lens of racial equity and the social determents of health
- Partner with the Buffalo Together Community Response Fund to respond to the 2022 Buffalo shooting with a long-term investment strategy for East Buffalo







# 3. Supporting Our Seniors

### **Mission Statement:**

The Older Adults Working Group is dedicated to making life more accessible and healthier for the older adults of Erie County. Together we want to work to expand options for older adults able to continue living full and independent lives, and that they are able to participate more fully in the community and feel better doing it.

### **Activity Summary Section:**

The Older Adults Working Group consists of subcommittees focused on: transportation, financial security, and a broader wellness subcommittee that includes mental health and nutrition. In support of our mission, in 2022 the Older Adults Working Group focused on evaluating our Priorities and Strategies to ensure that we were meeting the needs and interests of Older Adults in Erie County.

We held an open Town Hall meeting with nearly 200 older adult community members to solicit feedback, and then worked within our subcommittees to ensure that we were responding to the needs expressed. The Transportation Subcommittee found that even with some on-demand transportation options, older adult transportation needs were still not being met due to driver shortages and lack of sufficient options.



The Financial Security subcommittee expanded financial literacy courses in the Department of Senior Services University Express catalog and began exploring options for re-skilling and up-skilling older adults for continued employment.

Finally, the Wellness Subcommittee continues to find older adults seeking connection and sought to build community connections with smaller groups focused on specific areas of compatibility, including new Fantasy Football leagues, hybrid life-long learning classes, and mental health awareness.

## List of Priorities for 2023:

- · Explore options for a more efficient and costeffective transportation model to allow older adults to move freely among the County in conjunction with the Department of Senior Services' Transportation Consultant's finding
- Additional Live Well Erie host Town Hall Meetings in urban, suburban, and rural communities to collect data, understand the issues, and find solutions for current older adult concerns
- A forthcoming social media campaign encouraging all community members to reach out and connect with an older adult in their community and increase awareness of services available to them
- Increase education on opioid addiction and reduce stigma of seeking mental health and addictionrelated treatment
- Seek funding to create and distribute emergency preparedness boxes for older adults as a precaution for future weather events
